## From the Pastor...

Dear Fellow Disciples in Christ,

Some reflections along the way:

We have begun a new era in our musical capabilities as Bruce demonstrated on Palm Sunday and again on Easter. Our new digital organ has a vast array of additional sounds that will continue to enhance our worship services, both traditional and contemporary, in the months and years to come. Now it remains for us to repay the loan from the Endowment Committee that enabled its purchase in a timely manner. In the coming weeks everyone will have an opportunity to make a financial committee. If you have not had an opportunity to attend worship in person recently, plan to do so in the coming weeks. We anticipate an opportunity to hold a dedicatory organ concert at some point in the fall.

Don't miss our opportunity to celebrate the ministries of three of Trinity's staff on May 15<sup>th</sup> at the 9:30 AM service of worship and at the brunch that will follow. Trinity has been blessed by the ministries of Bruce Rohrbach, Director of Music (15 years), Seth Noggle, Director of Youth and Family Ministry (10 years), and Lisa Finke, Administrative Assistant (7 years) *retired.* It promises to be a special day not only for these faithful servants of God, but also for all of us, for together we have been called to make Christ known.

We have begun a study of *Revelation*, the last book of the Bible. It will continue for several more weeks. Why not plan to join us as we seek to engage with what some have called the most revealing book of the Bible (pun intended). So often we avoid *Revelation* because its imagery seems to be so fantastic, but at its base level it is a book written to 7 churches that are in various degrees of struggle and difficulty. The message John seeks to deliver to them is one of hope and the promise that through faithfulness to God there will be a future. In times like we are experiencing in the church of our day it is a message that I believe we all need to hear and heed.

At the last Congregation Council meeting I floated the idea of resettling a refugee family. Currently, there is a need for resettlement hosts for refugees from Afghanistan and in the near future from Ukraine due to the invasion by Russia. Finally, the summer is fast approaching and I hope that you will find time for renewal and recreation with those you love. Don't forget Trinity as you do so. The congregation and I as your Transitional Pastor stand ready to be the hands and feet and heart of God for you and any who desire God's presence and grace in their lives.

Again, the campaign's primary goal is to ensure that Trinity is able to repay its loan from the Endowment Fund within the three years of the loan agreement, and its secondary goal is eventually to enable renovations to Trinity's facilities that will make it more accessible for individuals with physical limitations.

The Capital Campaign planning team of Amy Pfeiler-Wunder, David Esser, Robert Hobaugh, Dan Raudenbush and Bruce Rohrbach have worked with Pastor Ritter to create a campaign worthy of your support that will enable the start of a new chapter in the life of Trinity. ## Call Committee Update...

Now that we have entered into the Easter season, we have new hope. Our Mission Site Profile or MSP has been updated to include changes that have taken place in our congregation over the past year. The MSP is the document that the synod gives to prospective candidates to review for them to determine if they are interested in meeting with our call committee. Some revisions to our MSP include: becoming a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation, recently purchasing a new digital organ, and entering into a Capital Campaign to both repay the organ loan and to raise funds to make our building more accessible. We are hopeful that these revisions will be seen in a positive light by any prospective candidates. Please keep the work of our call committee in your prayers.

## Creation Care Team...

What a wonderful time of year to celebrate with awe the beauty that abounds in God's creation. With daffodils, tulips and flowering trees blooming we are reminded that life abounds. We as members of the Creation Care Team believe we are called to nurture God's beautiful creation. to learn more about environmental stewardship, and to educate. At a recent team meeting we were discussing community supported agriculture or CSA. Essentially, by joining a CSA, members are buying a portion or share of a local farm's harvest for the year. You pay an initial fee up front in exchange for a weekly box of fresh, seasonal items. What you receive in your share will depend on the specific farm, but offerings typically include fruits and vegetables. It may also include dairy, eggs, baked goods and flowers. Farmers benefit from this community support. The early payment from shareholders provides money to purchase seeds, farm supplies, plan for labor expenses, and can identify their market before the beginning of the season. Likewise, the consumer benefits by getting the freshest local foods available throughout the year. Although you are putting up a significant amount of money initially, you get a ton of organic produce each week and save money in the long run. There are a variety of health benefits to eating fresh fruits and vegetables, however, there are also benefits for the environment for purchasing from local farms. Some environmental advantages include: 1) less CO2 emissions from the energy required to transport and refrigerate produce across long distances, 2) no groundwater pollutions from pesticides and fertilizers, which ensures better drinking water for us and future generations, and 3) no damage to

the fish population from pollution caused by runoff of fertilizers that feed oxygen-depleting organisms and throws off the balance of our fisheries, lakes, and ponds. Fortunately, we live in a farming community and are able to purchase from the farmer's market and local farm stands. If you are interested in purchasing a CSA share, we have learned that Taproot Farm will have a local weekly pickup point in Kutztown at Four Monkeys Coffee Shop on Constitution Blvd. For more information visit <u>https://taprootfarmpa.com/</u> or search for other CSA locations.

## SITUATION REPORT: CRISIS IN

# UKRAINE

#### April 13, 2022 | No. 4

#### LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF RESPONSE

We have committed \$7 million to respond to this crisis, and we expect to increase this amount as we secure additional funding.

Our Humanitarian Action team is working with partners to implement programming based on short and long-term needs in Poland and in Ukraine. We have deployed additional technical staff to support our relief operations, including a program manager, a health advisor, and an advisor to lead our efforts to prevent sexual exploitation and abuse in Ukraine and for Ukrainian refugees.

#### Our response in Ukraine includes:

- Medical supplies and equipment. We are supporting health facilities in Ukraine in partnership with the Order of Malta by providing supplies, including surgical and wound care kits, gauze, IV kits, oxygen masks, defibrillators and stretchers.
- Partnerships with networks throughout Ukraine to provide shelter. We are partnering with networks in Ukraine to provide ongoing support to six facilities that are being used to shelter internally displaced persons. We're providing food and essential supplies and equipment, like folding beds, pillows, heaters, laundry detergent, toilet paper, and personal hygiene items. In all, we'll offer nearly 60,000 nights of shelter for people who need a place to stay.
- Identifying key gaps in the availability of services. We are designing an assessment process to identify key gaps in the availability of health services related to genderbased violence, mental health services and psychosocial services and communicable diseases. This work will be used to inform our response to support the Ministry of Health and other health care providers in Ukraine.

#### Our response in Poland includes:

• Emergency cash and vouchers for Ukrainian refugees in Poland. We've committed \$2 million to this effort in a combined program with Lutheran World Federation (LWF) that will support an initial caseload of more than 1,300 refugee families for the next three months.

• Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse: We're integrating a referral system at our cash distribution sites in Poland so refugee women and children can safely and easily access protection services. We are an active mem

ber of the Regional Gender Task Force for Ukraine response, which is co-chaired by UN Women and Care International.

• Ongoing support for the Evangelical-Augsburg Church of St. Martin in Krakow, Poland, which has established a hostel for Ukrainian women and children. We have provided essential supplies including milk, energy biscuits, personal hygiene products and room partition panels. We will continue to support the church to expand its relief operations in coordination with LWF.

• Shipping and distributing LWR Quilts and Care Kits in partnership with local organizations.

We are grateful for the thousands of Lutherans across the United States whose care and generosity have made it possible for us to respond immediately. At this time, financial gifts are the number one need to assist refugees on the move.



## What's it like to be a Pastoral Intern in NEPA? By Melissa Hrdlicka

It is hard to believe I have been on internship with Common Ground Recovery Community for nine months already! My time with Common Ground has been a deep blessing to me and to my education. I have witnessed the presence of God in the open vulnerable sharing during our Wednesday worship, in the heartfelt reverent "thank you's" when serving communion and meals in downtown Reading and in our study of the scriptures and 12-steps. Common Ground truly is a place of radical love and where God's grace embraces our brokenness.

As part of my internship project, I invited our worshiping communities and ministry partners to reflect on these three questions: What does Common Ground mean to you? What does community mean to you? And where do you see God here and in the world? They then drew on white cotton squares that will be sewn together to make an altar cloth to fit all of our communion tables. The responses were profound and beautiful!
