From the Pastor...

Dear Disciples in Christ,

After 40+ years as an ordained pastor I must admit that there are times I find it hard to come up with material for my letter for the congregation's newsletter. This is not one of them as Trinity will have multiple opportunities to celebrate God's presence in our midst and that of the wider community this fall. Here is what's in store for us.

On September 11th we will be celebrating "God's Work, Our Hands" in worship and through participating in picking potatoes as part of the Potato Project that afternoon. "God's Work, Our Hands" is an ELCA wide effort designed to engage members of congregations in service to their community and beyond. Watch for more details regarding this service project and an opportunity to sign up to pick potatoes.

The following week, Sunday, September 18, we will be dedicating our new digital Allen organ at our 9:30 AM worship. Special music is being planned for the morning as we continue to experience the breadth and depth of the new instrument that we were able to purchase due to the generosity of many of you. There is information regarding the completion of our recent capital campaign's commitment phase elsewhere in this newsletter. Also in regard to the organ, a special dedicatory concert is in the planning stages for Sunday, October 30. Watch for further details regarding this event.

During Vicar Davis' tenure at Trinity and with the guidance of Terry and Rita Lieb, a group met to reflect upon questions regarding who are the strangers in our midst and what needs are there to be met. The group took the moniker of "Think Tank". It became the impetus for moving forward with becoming a Reconciling in Christ congregation and a new ministry being born as I write this letter.

One of the underserved groups in our community, certainly from a spiritual perspective, are those persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Through the efforts of Charlene and Steve Fisher, Karen Raudenbush and Louise DeVall and a dedicated group of individuals representing other local congregations, Sunday, October 2, at 3 PM in St. Paul UCC, the first gathering of a Rejoicing Spirits worship and fellowship ministry will come to life. I recently attended a meeting of the group behind this new ministry, and I was moved by their energy and excitement for the ministry they are in the process of birthing. A special thank you is owed to God's disciples at St. Paul for their commitment and willingness to make their facilities available for this new ministry.

Another opportunity to grow our ministry is a partnership with the Social Work Department at Kutztown University that Trinity, the Student food pantry at the Lutheran Centre and St. Barnabas Community Center are developing for the current academic year. Three senior BSW interns will be assigned to Trinity and the other 2 organizations to strengthen our work and ministries in the wider community. I am looking forward to working with our intern who will focus their support upon our Kutztown Kitchen ministry with Ann Towne, the development of small group ministries and other activities as time allows. Each intern will serve a total of 400 hours over the coming academic year (approx. 16 hrs./wk.) with their assigned organization.

Finally, I believe that it is important for Trinity to engage in a strategic planning process in the coming months. Plans for this endeavor are in the formative stages, but I look forward to working with all of you to create a process that will be responsive to God's call to be in ministry and will enable Trinity to grow and continue to move forward in all areas of its ministry.

As you can see, there is much for Trinity to celebrate. Plan to be a part of these momentous times in the life of our congregation. God is not finished with us yet even though our time of transition is longer than we first thought.

Rejoicing Spirits – A New Ecumenical Community Ministry

Greetings Fellow Trinity Members!

For the past two and a half years several members of Trinity have been working towards establishing a monthly worship service and fellowship opportunity for individuals with cognitive disabilities and their families and friends. Realizing that this was bigger than just Trinity, we invited neighboring congregations to join us in our endeavor. Six churches are now working together to plan our first service which will be on **October 2**, **2022 at 3:00 pm**. The location will be at St. Paul's UCC, Kutztown, 47 S. Whiteoak Street. St. Paul's UCC was selected because of the building's accessibility. The sanctuary, fellowship hall, restrooms and kitchen are all located on one floor.

St. Paul's UCC, Kutztown will be a recognized Rejoicing Spirits host site, focusing on the needs of individuals with intellectual disabilities. This worship service is "shush-free", meaning Rejoicers (participants) may participate in ways they feel comfortable. This could include standing,

clapping, shouting out, and speaking freely. The service is filled with music and singing, centered around a short Bible verse or thought for the day. It also includes a Bible story or brief sermon (3-4 minutes). Time is provided for the Rejoicers to socialize. The Rejoicers actively participate in the worship service by reading scripture, leading prayers, and singing songs of praise.

Our committee has been busy. We have conducted a feasibility study to determine if there is a need for this type of worship service in this area. The answer was a resounding yes! Our neighbors at St. Paul's UCC completed a Congregational Audit, answering questions about the accessibility of their church facility. We have had coaching calls with the national Rejoicing Spirits organization. We have also zoomed, emailed and shared phone calls with our neighbors in Lehigh County - the Lutheran Church of the Holy Spirit in Emmaus, which has been a host site for Rejoicing Spirits for 14 years. They have shared their experience with us, and our most interesting take away from them is that many of the volunteers as well as the Rejoicers find Rejoicing Spirits to be the most meaningful service in which they have ever participated.

As our monthly Rejoicing Spirits service becomes a reality in October, we are looking for volunteers to share in our endeavor. Here are some ways to participate:

- Greet and welcome Rejoicers and their families in the parking lot and direct them to the entrance of St. Paul's UCC.
- Help Rejoicers sign in and get a name tag at the Welcome table.
- 3. Usher Rejoicers to the sanctuary and/or fellowship hall.
- 4. Plan and provide simple snacks and drinks for a fellowship time after the service.
- 5. Participate in the service by singing and/or playing an instrument.
- 6. Help to setup and cleanup the space.

Do you have peace like a river, joy like a fountain and a love for your Jesus in your soul? We welcome you to share that love as a volunteer through our community Rejoicing Spirits services. Capital Campaign...

Commitment Phase of Capital Campaign Concludes Successfully

The commitment phase of our **Starting a New Chapter** capital campaign has come to a close. It was a successful campaign in that sufficient pledges were returned to suggest that Trinity will not only be able to repay the loan it took for the new digital organ, but also in the near future make Trinity a more hospitable place for

those with mobility issues. A total of 40 commitment cards were returned. Twelve indicated that they would give as they are able. Twenty-eight made a specific dollar commitment over the 3-year life of the campaign. Those who made a specific dollar commitment pledged to give \$168,550 over the life of the campaign. When a formula is applied counting on those who indicated that they will give as they are able it appears that Trinity should expect approximately \$200,000.

Thank you to all those who returned a commitment card. If you did not return a commitment card and would still like to contribute to this cause, you can do so by making an online, cash or check contribution. Always be sure to note that your gift is for the **Starting a New Chapter** campaign. Together we continue to move Trinity forward into the future God has planned for it.

So Noah went out with his sons and his wife and his sons' wives. And every animal, every creeping thing, and every bird, everything that moves on the earth, went out of the ark by families... God said, "This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth."

As the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, we are honored and grateful to take part in this life-giving ministry, offering our resources, our time and our spaces, to make a bright new day for these kids, these families, and "for all future generations."

Have you ever felt overwhelmed and unable to cope with a situation? There have been times during covid that many have felt that way—worry about those who were sick-concerned for families who had lost someone. It was hard enough for adults-but what about children? Camp Noah is a Lutheran camping organization run out of Minnesota that provides weeklong camp experiences for children who have experienced traumatizing natural disasters like tornados, floods, hurricanes—and covid.
